"Call to Me and I will answer you and tell you great and mighty things that you do not know." Jeremiah 33:3




SPRING ALL CHURCH STUDY

When I first got to Humboldt in 2022, I'll be honest I didn't know what to expect. Especially when it came to Christian community. Not to belittle Humboldt, California, but I knew that I wasn't coming to a place that would be overly welcoming to Christians. And due to that fact, it led me to a natural fear that maybe I wouldn't even find Christian community. However, I can say with much joy and confidence that I was proven very, very wrong.

Growing up I always went to public school. Kindergarten to senior year of high school I was in the same neighborhood, same school district with the same people. But by no means was my school district small. To give you some perspective I graduated with a class of 1,000 students. But this is beside the point. I never attended a Christian school, and growing up Christian I knew that when I got to college, I wanted it to be different. I knew that I wanted to go to a Christian university. In fact, the only

school I applied to that wasn't a Christian university was Humboldt State University, and I applied to it because I thought it was a pretty location and it was small. That was it. In 1 Corinthians 12, the apostle Paul addresses the Church and how we. the members, are the body of Christ. In verses 12-13 he states, "For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so is it with Christ. For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body-Jews or Greeks, slaves or freeand all were made to drink of one Spirit". As well as verses 25-27, "that there may be no division in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together. Now you are the body of Christ, individually members of it."

When we are brought into the family of God we are then the body of Christ, and being the body of Christ means exactly what the apostle Paul says. We suffer together. We rejoice together. We do life with one another, because we are called to do such a thing. Our God didn't create us to be independent creatures.

From the moment He created Adam in Genesis 2:18 He states, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper fit for him." God reminds us continually of our need for each other. In Hebrews 10:24-25 Paul addresses the Hebrews saying, "And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near."

In 1 Peter 4:8-11 he says, "Above all, keep loving one another earnestly, since love covers a multitude of sins. Show hospitality to one another without grumbling. As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace: whoever speaks, as one who speaks oracles of God; whoever serves, as one who serves by the strength that God supplies—in order that in everything God may be glorified through Jesus Christ. To him belong glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen. "

We are meant to be in relationship with one another, and as a nervous new freshman first arriving at Humboldt State University, this church was more than an answered prayer. And it has provided me with exactly what God calls us to have.
